

Our Cross Connection program is continuing this summer. Our backflow tester will be working through the system testing devices and inspecting properties.


As a courtesy to our members, Nob Hill Water will continue to test backflow devices at no charge to the homeowner.

2005 DROUGHT

Are we running out of water? Nob Hill Water is supplied by deep wells. While a drought year can have a major impact on surface waters (rivers and lakes), a single dry year typically does not have a significant effect on deep ground water sources. So, we do not anticipate a shortage from our normal supply. However, wise water use is always important, both to save money and to conserve this precious resource.

Tips for outdoor use:

- Water less often for longer periods. Deep watering promotes deep root growth and healthy lawns.
- Water early in the morning or late in the evening. Avoid watering in the heat of the day or when it's windy.
- Place a 2" to 4" layer of mulch around plants and trees to avoid excess evaporation.
- Avoid watering sidewalks and streets.
- Only water when needed.
